The dancers will start in the area fronting Radio Shack. They'll wend their way through the center blessing stores, restaurants and the people in the crowd who put money into the lions' mouths in exchange for their blessings. An interesting fact: Offering money to the lion is strictly a Hawai'i tradition; it doesn't exist in Asia.
